## TWENTY20 COMPETITION REVIEW

The Willetton Crows finished the Twenty20 competition as runners-up after finishing the qualifying round in second position after winning all four matches before the decider against Phoenix.

The Crows were sent into bat by Riverton-Rostrata in the final round of qualifying matches and made 6-136 with Richard Oliver, John Gallagher and captain Peter Brown ensuring that a competitive total was reached before Paul Tunncliffe tore through the top order to ensure victory for the home side.

Having finished in second place, Willetton were drawn to host a Semi-Final against a Bullett side that was cobbled together by Rob Sims to avoid a bye in the competition with a mix of players from Hilton Palmyra, Leeming (and turncoats such as Simo and Allan Chellew!). Having batted first and been dismissed for 113 in the 17th over, it looked like the Crows' run was going to end but a dogged display in the field restricted the opposition to 8-111 from their full allotment of overs to make it through to the final against Phoenix, who overcame the challenge of Cockburn in a tight Semi-Final.

Phoenix have proved to be a stellar performer at the short form of the game and did so again with a 22-run win over the Crows at Tempest Reserve. Phoenix made 147 after Natale and Rourke posted solid contributions despite the bowling efforts of Barry Savage (arguably the Crows' best bowler in the competition) and Nick Macek, who both took two wickets each.

In reply, Ben Wotherspoon's innings of 60 gave Willetton's score a touch of respectability but there wasn't enough support for the Crows to be able to take out the Twenty20 title.

# FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

The Willetton Crows have confirmed a place in the SMCA Second Grade Finals after heading into the last round of the home and away season with three successive wins, including two against prospective finals rivals.

In Round 11, the Crows won the toss and batted against strugglers East Fremantle at Willetton Reserve. Pat Vallence (79) and John Gallagher (39) added 121 runs for the second wicket to give the home side a good start and were supported by the middle order trio of Ben Wotherspoon (44no), Brendan Hornby (19) and Carlos Dos Santos (21) as the Crows finished with 235 from 63.3 overs.

East Fremantle's run chase was stifled as they struggled to 3-40 due to the effective bowling of Tim Sewell (2-50) and Barry Savage (3-46 from 23 overs, including 9 maidens). Two partnerships of 55 and 51 were countered by consistent breakthroughs and East Fremantle were all out for 193 in the 68th over to secure a Crows' victory.

Top four side Maddington played host to the Crows at Harmony Fields, who sent the visitors in and had them on the back foot at 4-34 before Richard Oliver (21), Barry Savage (36) and Ben Wotherspoon (48) put the innings back on the right foot and gave the bowlers something to work with as the innings was completed for 170 in 61 overs.

The opening pair of Barry Savage (3-30 from 18.1 overs) and Andrew Jacobs (2-64) then put pressure on the home side as they were left reeling at 5-35. Good support came from Tim Sewell (2-11 from 8.4) and John Gallagher (3-40) to reduce the opportunities for the Bulls to close in on the victory target, apart from a 53 run ninth wicket partnership which began to threaten the Crows' hopes. The decisive break came and victory came soon after as Maddington were dismissed for 148.

With victory needed against Leeming Spartans to ensure a place in the finals with a round to spare, Willetton shorted the odds by racking up 268 from 71.2 overs, thanks to contributions from First XI debutant Stuart Miller (79), John Gallagher (45) skipper Peter Brown (39no) in the unaccustomed role of lower-order batsman and Barry Savage (30).

Spartans were never allowed to get into the contest, being reduced to 3-25 in the early stages before a secondary collapse meant that the last seven wickets fell in the space of 26 runs to be dismissed for 82 inside 35 overs. Tim Sewell was the wrecker with the scintillating figures of 12 overs, 3 maidens and 7-16 and Peter Brown held four catches in a clinical effort in the field.

Following on, the home side were 5-87 at stumps, with Brendan Hornby having the best figures of 2-4 from 5 overs and Richard Oliver chipped in with 1-10.

## SECOND ELEVEN REPORT

Willetton heads into the final round of the season in seventh position, safe in the knowledge that they have avoided the wooden spoon after breaking a six match losing run, but they will need to defeat the second-placed Phoenix if they wish to pass Thornlie and finish the season in sixth spot.

The side's run of outs continued against CBC at Burrendah Reserve when the away side decided to bat first and ended the day on 9-200 after a consistent display by the batting side. Paul Tunncliffe's good form with the ball continued with 3-45 from 18 overs and the economical Steve Patmore finished with 2-28 from his 14 overs.

The reply with the bat was one to forget as only three players managed to reach double figures. Dave Clough made 62 batting at number three, opener Kevin Savige contributed 22 and Arnav Ajurani was unbeaten on 10 at the end of the innings. The other eight batsmen managed just 16 runs and the number of sundries matched this lamentable figure as the Crows were dismissed for 125.

The Crows were able to once again feel the joy of victory when they met East Fremantle in a Saturday/Sunday match at Willetton Reserve ... exactly three months after their last win. Opener Daniel Davey blasted 71 to ensure that the home side's run rate progressed well and Rob Sims made a stylish 48 in the top order as the Crows were in a good position at 4-132. Then came the customary collapse as Paul Tunncliffe, Derek Mott and Geoff Chellew all made 12 and there was not enough impetus for the side to bat throughout the day and push the score beyond 200 as the side were dismissed for 184.

Keegan Walker (3-35) and a raft of maiden overs by Adam Wilson started proceedings off on the right foot as the visitors struggled to get early runs on the board and on the second day the variety of Adam Wilson (2-21 from 12 overs with 6 maidens) and spinner Rob Sims (3-35 from 20.4 overs) put the brakes on any attempt by East Fremantle to score runs and the match was evenly poised at 6-92. Derek Mott (2-41 from 16 overs) and Sims then bowled in tandem when the vital breakthroughs were made. In between the two catches taken (the first and also the last wicket), there were eight batsmen bowled and NINE dropped catches. The Crows eventually got out of jail when East Fremantle were bowled out for 159 to give the home side a 25 run win.

The chance to string a winning run together was thwarted by Hilton Palmyra in the Crows' fourth home game in a row after another inconsistent batting display. Hilton Palmyra were sent into bat and made 205 despite the good bowling performances of Adam Wilson (4-18) and converted slow bowler Omar Bangash (4-37). The fielding effort was an improvement on the previous match and captain Paul Tunncliffe led the way with three catches.

Tunncliffe also led the way with the bat, making 69 in the Crows' innings, but he didn't have enough support as Steve Patmore (27), Derek Mott (18) and Andrew Jacobs (18) were the other performers with the bat. In the end, the home side batted for an encouraging 71 overs but finished with a total of 183, which was 23 short of victory.

# THIRD ELEVEN REPORT

The Willetton Crows' chances of making the One Day A Finals took a mortal blow with a run of two defeats leaving the Crows eighteen points outside the 'Four with two rounds remaining in the season.

Having a bad run against Armadale this season, the Crows travelled to Gwynne Park and made a challenging 8-208 after opener Owen Lawton pounded 83, Andrew Morrice scored a solid 32 and Evan Pappas made a determined 17 before restricting the home side to 180 with six overs in hand. Pace bowlers Omar Bangash (3-28), Derek Mott (3-32) and Stuart Miller (3-38) all toiled hard in stifling heat to peg down the Armadale's batsmen and give the visitors a 28 run win to keep them in the hunt for a finals berth.

The Crows then had a tough weekend with must-win matches against potential finalists Forrestdale and Leeming Spartans. The Crows batted first against Forrestdale at William Skeet Oval and were rattled for 128 against the one-day powerhouse with only acting captain Dave Clough (32), opener Allan Chellew (20) and Andrew Morrice (12) reaching double figures. Carlos Dos Santos proceeded to tear through the home side's line-up, snaring 4-32 from his 8 overs and have them in trouble at 6-67. Allan Chellew made a valuable contribution late in the game with 2-6 from 2 overs, including two of the last three wickets as Forrestdale were dismissed for 124 in the 33rd over to give the Crows a narrow four run win.

The next day, a consistent display by the Willetton batsmen allowed them to post a score of 8-134 against Leeming Spartans at Willetton Reserve. Max Maesepp top-scored with just 20, whilst Evan Pappas, Evan McMurtie and James Della Bonna (not out) all made 15 with the bat. The ever-consistent bowling attack did it again as Max Maesepp (3-13 from 6), Arnav Ajurani (2-20), Simon Acomb (2-27) and Dave Clough (2-38) all got amongst the wickets and caused Leeming to lose their last eight wickets or 24 en route to a total of 97 with 13.4 overs in hand.

Phoenix sent Willetton into bat in Round 18 and the home side posted a respectable 162, with John McMurtrie top-scoring with 42, Dave Clough chipped in with 26 and Andrew Morrice hitting 21 before a destructive fourth wicket partnership of 90 was the catalyst for the end of a five-game winning run. Phoenix finished with 9-194, with Dave Clough (3-19) and Max Maesepp (3-38) both taking three scalps each, whilst Elliott McLaughlin finished with figures of 2-36.

In a match that was moved to Coker Park, Murdoch University won the toss and batted and posted a score of 195 on the back of three major contributors. Max Maesepp was once again amongst the wickets with 3-38, whilst Ali Saeed and Simon Acomb both took two wickets each. Unfortunately, too much rested upon the shoulders of Andrew Morrice (57) as no other player managed to reach a score of 20, the next best being Evan Pappas and Ali Saeed who both scored 14 in a total of 135, which gave Murdoch University a 60-run win and ended the Crows' finals hopes.

# FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

With two rounds remaining in the home and away season, the Fourth XI have stitched up the minor premiership with a record of 17 wins and two losses and are currently more than 74 points inside the 'Four.

At Frye Park, the Crows batted first and made 7-196 on the back of an unbeaten 101 run eighth wicket partnership between Matt Parlet (60no) and Maxwell Maesepp (38no). Chris Watts once again batted well in making 18 and opener Des Carruthers scored 17. Kelmscott were looking in a position of strength at 6-165, but some devastating bowling by spinner Tim Spears (4-16) caused the home side to lose their last four wickets for just one run. Glenn Dobson was once again amongst the wickets, taking 3-31 from his 8 overs and Maxwell Maesepp bowled well for his 2-24 and finished an excellent all-round performance with four catches.

Armadale were the next team to feel the brunt of the Crows batsmen and bowlers in their Round 16 match at Gwynne Park when the Crows made 5-251 batting first with the top four batsmen all amongst the runs. The McMurtie's added 92 runs for the first wicket as Evan made 62 and John contributed 30, whilst Chris Watts hit 62 and captain Glenn Dobson scored 56. Armadale's reply started badly, losing their first three wickets for 27 before consolidating to 3-80. Dick Manning then proceeded to tear through the middle and lower order with 4-8 from 6 overs and we was well-supported by opening bowlers Chris Watts (2-12) and Glenn Dobson (2-18). Armadale were dismissed for 109 from the second-last ball of their innings to give the Crows a 142-run win.

Aiming for their eleventh straight win, the Crows hosted fellow top four side Kardinya Lakes at Burrendah Reserve. Kardinya Lakes won the toss, batted first and posted a challenging 5-196 with Daniel Jackson being the only bowler to take multiple wickets with 2-25 from 8 overs. In reply, Willetton started well with a 72-run opening stand between Dick Manning and Kristen Judge (both 31) before a run of wickets left the home side on the back foot at 6-111. Despite an unbeaten 42 from Des Carruthers, the Crows were unable to reach the target and were dismissed for 174 in the 39th over.

At Coker Park, the Crows bounced back with a clinical display to defeat bottom team Canning Districts. The home side were rolled for 50 as the quartet of Tim Spears (3-8), Apratim Dasdidar (3-13), Matt Parlet (2-15) and Chris Peters (1-19) completed the task in 21.1 overs. The runs were shared around in the Willetton score of 7-241 as captain Kristen Judge slammed 75, Des Carruthers knocked up an unbeaten 36, Rob Hamer chipped in with 33 and Matt Parlett hit 29.

Last weekend, the Crows ended the finals chances of Maddington as another large total was posted by the Willetton batsmen. The Bulls were unable to contain the duo of Apratim Dasdidar (5-32) and Chris Peters (3-41) and made 86 from 22.1 overs, before the Crows went on the rampage and slammed 5-274 from their 40 overs. Chris Watts led the way with a sparkling display of batting, making an unconquered 101, John McMurtrie added 38 and opener Joel Manning scored 27.

# “SUNDRIES” ... the lighter side of cricket

## THIS GUY DESERVED A FLAG! ...

Mick Le Grand is probably Australia's unluckiest cricketers. He is one of those dedicated club men that make clubs tick, turning up week in, week out for Mazenod Old Collegians in Melbourne's Eastern Cricket Association. The 28 year old, whose highest score with the bat was 58, has played competitive cricket for 20 years and before this season had made it to 10 senior finals ... for 10 defeats!

The 2007-08 season saw him try again and once again, the 'Noddies made it through the semi-finals in B1 grade where they met Burwood Uniting in the final at Greythorn Park. Trying to avoid another loss in a decider, Le Grand was a man inspired, volunteering to open the batting and went on to make 99 before being bowled as his side reached an imposing total of 308. In reply, Burwood Uniting were all out for 200 to give Mazenod the premiership ... and Le Grand his first premiership medal!

## CRICKETING TERMS EXPLAINED (Part 4) ...

### **MANKAD**

*The origin comes from a Sydney Test between Australia and India when Indian spinner Vinoo Mankad ran out Australian opener Bill Brown without warning after Brown backed up too far. The cricket watching public did not forget: Mankad's name was bestowed on an act that they regarded as highly unsportsmanlike.*

### **PADS**

*They were introduced into cricket only with the advent of round-arm and over-arm bowling, which was sufficiently fast to injure the legs of batsman. Early cricketers did not consider it sporting to defend their wickets with their legs, so there was no need for pads - or indeed for an LBW law. The first pads were of wood and then, in 1836, H. Daubeney invented the forerunners of modern pads.*

### **POPPING CREASE**

*This term originates the popping hole that was a hole cut in the turf. This hole played a major part in the rules of early cricket, as the batsman had to place his bat in this hole on completion of a 'notch' or run. In order to get the batsman out the wicketkeeper had to put the ball in the hole before the batsman could reach it with his bat. This however led to serious hand injuries and was eventually superseded by the batsman having to touch a stick held by the umpire. The popping hole was eventually represented symbolically in the modern game by a popping crease for the purposes of scoring a run.*

## “SUNDRIES” ... the lighter side of cricket

### UMPIRE

The term derives from the Middle English term ‘noupere’, which means a ‘non-peer’ or ‘unequal’, indicating an ‘odd man’ or third party called in to adjudicate between two contestants. There have always been two umpires - an arrangement presumably dating back to the origins of the double-wicket game.

### YORKER

The term is believed to derive from a 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century regional slang connection between the words ‘Yorkshire’ and ‘york’ and the notion of cheating and deception. This derivation seems most likely, as the purpose of a good yorker is to deceive the batsman.
